

Introduction to postcolonial theory. Six weekly meetings, 2,5 hours each. Fall 2025 1927 Art Space, Kypselis 35

This 15 hour class will familiarize participants with the work of the main postcolonial thinkers (Said, Bhabha, Spivak, Fanon et al), trace postcolonial theory's links to other theoretical traditions, and discuss how it can be useful to us today as a tool of critical discourse, at a time when the effects of neocolonial policies are being felt on a daily basis. The class is addressed to students and graduates of the humanities, artists who are interested in theoretically supporting their work, and anyone interested in learning something new and expanding their knowledge into a new field of the humanities, regardless of previous experience or educational background.

Aktina has a PhD in theatre and postcolonial studies from the University of Toronto. Her dissertation titled Adaptation and Performance of Greek Tragedy in post-apartheid South Africa, analysed tragic texts through a postcolonial lens in order to examine how tragedy reflected the transitional state of SA from apartheid to democracy. Her articles have been presented in conferences worldwide (IFTR, ACLA et al) and published in academic journals and the press.
